Faith Alone

Key Words from Romans 3:21-4:25

But (v. 3:21)—an adversative, contrasting humanity's total depravity and inability to please God, and God's own provision of a way to Himself

justified (v. 3:24)—a forensic term meaning "to declare righteous"

propitiation (v. 3:25)—appeasement or satisfaction; Christ's death satisfied the offended holiness of God

passed over (v. 3:25)—a temporary withholding of judgment

accounted (4:3)—a word used in legal and financial settings; here to take something that belongs to someone and credit it to the account of another

David (v. 4:5)—King David's sin with Bathsheba is another Old Testament example of imputed righteousness.

justifies the ungodly (v. 4:5)—Only those who freely admit their unworthiness are candidates for salvation.

the sign of circumcision (v. 4:11)—the physical, racial mark of identity for the Jewish people

walk in the steps (v. 4:12)—those non-Jews who emulate Abraham's faith

faith is made void and the promise made of no effect (v. 4:14)—Paul is demonstrating that if adherence to the Law could save, then faith in God's promise would be worthless.

weak in faith (v. 4:19)-to allow doubt to erode and undermine belief

delivered up (v. 4:25)-to be crucified as punishment for human beings' sins
